He explained the importance of good training at the very start of one's career, "it helps build a strong foundation of good human values and soft skills, as well as technical knowledge and expertise in one's tasks, all of which ensure a really bright future ahead." He also advised the young boys that a strong foundation of basics, which will go hand in glove for building up skill and competence. He mentioned, "Knowledge, competence and skill both professional and human resource related are necessary to achieve professionalism." He also thanked Director General of Shipping

Mr. Chatterjee for taking out his valuable time amidst his busy and demanding schedule.

Capt Chawla further concluded, "the three pillars of professionalism are knowledge, skill and attitude.

Lack of proper lookout can be poor attitude which is the cause of major accidents on ships."

Speaking later with Sailor Today on his views about `Tomorrow`s Seafarer', Capt Pradeep Chawla pointed, "the future seafarer will be more knowledgeable, more intelligent and a far more technologically savvy person. He will need to have a high

professional sense and a pride in his own job. These qualities will be very essential in the future."

The special programme culminated with a tour of the entire Anglo Eastern Maritime Training Centre by the Chief Guest to witness various facilities and the specialized training equipment installed at AEMTC. A fitting start, to the inaugural batch of Second Mates Competency course with 24 cadets, all having completed their Pre-Sea training from Anglo Eastern Maritime Academy at Karjat, and their Sea Time on Anglo-Eastern ships.
